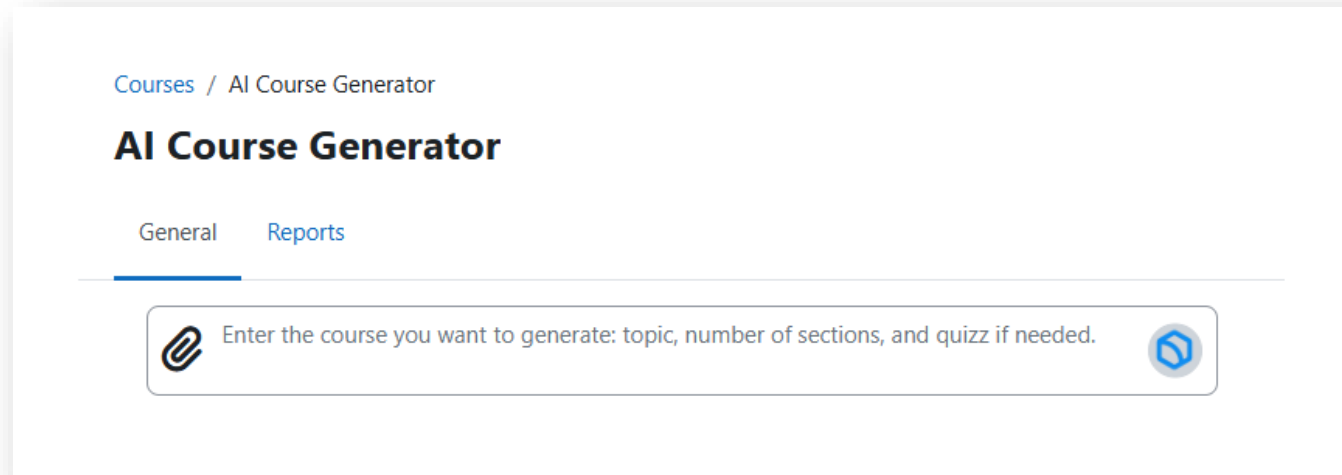


Dixeo Course Generator

- Enter the subject of the course and optionally the desired structure and activities, or a blank course
- Optionally attach your source files (PDF, Word, Powerpoint, audio/video transcript, URL, etc)
- Dixeo generates the content and activities, creates the course, and sets necessary parameters for use
- LaTeX and mathematical equations are supported
